NEN & Covid-19

What We Learned & How We Adapted



The pandemic that had swept the world since early 2020 has left in its wake a 'shadow pandemic' to which no region has remained immune or unaffected.

This shadow pandemic is the heightened violence and abuse against women and girls stemming from security, health and money concerns and worsened by the lockdown measures. Women are bearing the brunt of the economic fallout of the current COVID-19 crisis. According to the Global Gender Gap

Report of 2020, it will take 95 years to close the gender gap in political representation. The situation is even worse as far as economic participation is considered. As per the report, it will require 257 years to attain gender parity in economic participation globally. So, the COVID-19 pandemic has, in fact, worsened the situation for women.

Across North East India, as all institutions closed and health systems got overloaded, care for children and sick relatives largely fell on women who already perform over three quarters of the unpaid care and domestic work. Incidents of VAW were increasingly reported showing that the policy of isolation and confinement leads to increased levels of domestic, sexual, and gender-based violence – and therefore, to a heightened need of protection against this.

Consequently, it was a vital area of focus for North East Network to maintain a steady connection with our grassroot leaders and the rural women communities we have been engaged with across Assam, Meghalaya, and Nagaland. COVID-19 and Lockdowns brought with it severe restrictions on travelling which made attending trainings/workshops and meetings physically impossible. We, as an organisation, had to adapt quickly to the exclusive use of technology and virtual mediums. The team had to equip themselves with latest technologies and applications to



carry the work forward. We learnt to identify the challenges and needs of our communities and had to constantly adjust and respond to the ever- changing situation.

In Assam, the lockdown period brought with it a big hurdle of reaching the women beneficiaries who are located across 6 districts. With our field workers unable to travel, we begun with training the women on the use of social media platforms to be able to stay connected. Digital empowerment for these rural women became the need of the hour so that we could continue our monitoring and provide guidance and support. During the lockdown, our community mobilisers reached out to community women over phone to inform them on COVID-19, its transmission and preventive measures which would help protect themselves. Our

mobilisers put up posters in public places to create awareness on COVID-19 amongst the communities, across all six districts in which NEN is engaged in Assam. We faced great hardships in providing counselling through our Gramin Mahila Kendra (GMK) as Lockdowns and Curfews prevented the aggrieved women from visiting GMKs. However, our barefoot counsellors attended every distress call we received and provided support to the aggrieved women via phone. The weaving initiative by NEN faced a major challenge in finding new orders and markets, collection of raw materials and products and responding to the buyers, as well. All our work was shared through online platforms, appealing people to procure local products and support our livelihood projects which are crucial for sustaining the economy of the communities that depend on them.

I write this soliciting your personal initiative in the full operationalization of a Standard Operational Procedure (SOP) developed by the Social Welfare Department as a response mechanism to distress calls from women facing abuse and violence while in the confines of their homes during the leckdown period. It is imperative to create an efficient system of delivery of services to women in distress in the light of reports of a sharp rise in the number of crimes reported against women and the apparent tack of clarity among stateholders on how to deal with distress calls in this period of

The SOP has been designed (copy enclosed) with a view to putting in place a clear articulation of responsibilities of various Departments and their agencies and to work out a system of providing support, including shelter, police assistance, psychological councoiling, legal assistance etc., to women in need without delay. All this is to be done while ensuring that admissions of women in need are given shelter in various government-run / government, funded shelter homes after following due protocol. Adequate provisions have also been included for taking care of reporting and Redressal at various levels.

I would request you to kindly read the SOP carefully and issue instructions to all concerned immediately. You may also initiate further innovative steps beyond the SQP to meet your local requirements. In conclusion, I would urge you to join hands with the Social Welfare Department in its endeavour to create a web of support for women in distress.

One of NEN's biggest achievements was a Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) on Women's access to Shelter Homes issued by the Department of Social Welfare, Government of Assam. Through our advocacy, Assam became the first state to issue such an SOP and it came as a huge relief to institutional care providers and women who were being denied access to shelter.

During the lockdown, the economically deprived had not been able to get access to basic essentials and as a result, food insecurities within marginalised communities have sky rocketed. The need of the hour was proper distribution of dry rations. Relief distribution in Assam was provided across 10 districts -- Darrang, Dhemaji, Dhubri, Golaghat, Goalpara, Morigaon, Kamrup, Kamrup (Metropolitan), Udalguri and Sonitpur. The drive was carried out by NEN's Community Mobilisers and Assistant Community Mobilisers, accompanied by support group members, women peer leaders and volunteers and Block Federations (Rural Women Collectives). In Golaghat, Darrang and Kamrup Gramin Mahila Kendras (GMK), which are also supported by APPI, took the initiative in the distributions. NEN had reached out to 1600 households directly and an additional 3200 households through the federation.

Around 3531 families and individuals across
Assam, Meghalaya, Arunachal Pradesh and
Manipur were supported with ration kits
through the Green Hub team and fellows'
network. In the month of July 2020, Assam
witnessed the worst flood in the last 8 years. So
we reached out to communities who lived in
flood-prone areas in Tezpur, Kaziranga, Gohpur,
Dhemaji, Sivasagar, Dibrugarh, Majuli, Morigaon
and Kamrup (R) districts through different
organisations, collectives and the Green Hub
fellows' network. We were able to support 2266
families through our flood response.

In order to support the local tailoring units during the pandemic, the Green Hub made 1 lakh masks with support from ONGC. Of these 1 lakh masks, 50,000 were sent to their unit in Sivasagar. The remaining 50,000 masks were distributed along with relief materials in Sonitpur, Kaziranga, Sivasagar and Morigaon.

We have also distributed the masks at market areas, tea plantations and factories in and around Sonitpur. Green Hub was also part of a network that helped migrant workers from the Northeastern states travel back to their homes.

In Meghalaya, we witnessed a surge in DV and other forms of VAW and children. To enable people to reach instantaneous psychosocial and legal support, posters with helpline numbers of our Outreach Workers deputed in the field were widely distributed. NEN was also working in tandem with the police, District Child Protection Units, Meghalaya State Commission for Women, and other likeminded NGOs to ensure that the aggrieved women and children are given immediate redressal mechanisms to access shelters, transportation, medical treatment, filing of Domestic Incident Reports, and POCSO cases during the pandemic.

The imposition of the nationwide lockdown due to the COVID-19 pandemic had adversely affected lives and livelihoods of many in Meghalaya. As part of our relief work, we were able to reach out to the vulnerable households with dry rations in East Khasi

Hills, West Khasi Hills, South-west Khasi Hills, Ri-Bhoi and West Jaintia Hills. COVID -19 kits were also distributed to the youth managing the quarantine centres. As VAW and children cases intensified with the pandemic in the State, our Outreach Workers worked hand in hand with the Dorbar Shnong to raise awareness, not only on Covid-19, but also on the increasing domestic violence and the need to address it. Menstrual health and hygiene awareness programmes were held and we distributed sanitary products donated by Procter and Gamble Limited, Mumbai, as we witnessed that many girls and women throughout the lockdown were unable to access sanitary kits. Sanitary pads were also distributed to the ASHA facilitators, the Superintendent of Police for women inmates in prisons and DorbarShnongs in several urban and rural localities.

Considering that physical gatherings were



prohibited due to the pandemic, many surveys were carried out telephonically.

NEN Meghalaya with SEWA and WHO conducted a project on 'Informal Women Workers' Response to Covid 19' where a cadre of 10 women master trainers were trained to launch an education campaign and amplify the awareness to 1227 other women on Coronavirus to reduce morbidity and mortality associated with the virus and support informal workers through psycho-social care.

In Nagaland, we responded to the immediate needs of food security and health through distribution of ration and hygiene kits; facilitating linkages to social

security and livelihood services. A total of 1284 economically marginalised women, vendors, and artisans' families received relief material in the form of hygiene kit, dry rations, and sanitary products. We quickly organised a cadre of community, youth, and women leaders to create community level awareness and disseminate information on COVID, referral care, hygiene and sanitation, psychosocial care, etc., through both offline (door to door) and online (telephonic and internet) mediums. The awareness campaign was well received by the communities, especially the elders who had no access to internet and were unable to get accurate information on the virus and other preventive measures. We made films with stories of hope and resilience to inform and educate communities on COVID preparedness. We, along with our community members, participated in various campaigns; sharing and learning through online events like the Online Seed Festival, Janta Parliament, Rising Gardens Film Festival, etc., and reached out to a wide audience during the pandemic.

In Nagaland, we saw biodiverse rich communities least affected by the pandemic in terms of food security. These communities stepped out and supplied food to urban areas; we saw the return of urban dwellers and young people to rural areas to grow food. Community women, women workers in the informal sector who suffered the most because of the COVID induced lockdown collectively stepped up and took leadership initiatives to continue and sustain their lives and livelihoods amid the lockdown, by negotiating for spaces with the local authorities.

Communities across North East India had been adversely impacted economically, mentally, emotionally by the pandemic since 2020; but on the positive side, we also witnessed the emergence of community resilience and leadership. The pandemic showed us the importance of nurturing local communities' capacities and resources that are connected closely to our land and forests. We learnt about the importance of sharing, learning and collaborations as diverse stakeholders, both Government, nongovernment, community institutions and individuals worked together in response to the pandemic.

The year 2020-21 has been a reminder of our interdependent lives and interconnectedness with our environment. This pandemic has also provided an opportunity for communities, for us to reflect, relearn, and re-focus our attention to healing and restoration of ecosystems, uphold ecologically sustainable livelihoods and jobs, promote localisation and decentralisation towards self- reliance, good health and access to healthcare systems.





The unseen agony of women in a patriarchal society

From dawn to dusk women spend their productive years toiling at home, all for the same reason 'because they are women'. Pune and Muchilu grew up believing the same- that because they are women, they must do the chores without question, while the same was not expected of the men or brothers at home. The realisation came much later for both and there was an urge, a feeling that needed to be heard. As Pune shares "I wanted to voice out, I felt that it's something I needed to share. I grew up thinking it's a women's job to do all the household chores"

Their first stint in mobile filmmaking training conducted at NEN Nagaland in December 2020 as part of the 16 days activism on Violence Against Women (VAW) was a life changing experience. The two women from Tsüpfüme attended the training on mobile filmmaking organised for community women and girls by Sophy Lasuh Kesiezie, a film maker from Nagaland. The participants were given the opportunity for a Call of submission for Story Telling through Participatory Video. The duo produced their first video titled 'The Unseen Agony', a short film on women and unpaid home responsibilities. The film throws light into the lives of women in Nagaland, the expectations on them to manage home, farm, raise children, and also be involved in other social obligations. The film questions why women's work is not considered work, and given due value?

Standing strong against Domestic Violence

NEN GMK in Golaghat, Assam received a frantic call for help from a distraught young woman Gita (name changed). 19 years old Gita had fled her abusive husband during the lockdown with her 5 months old baby. A couple days later, the husband forced himself into her parents' house and kidnapped the baby. On being informed, NEN community mobiliser Moon Borah immediately contacted the Village Defence Party, the village headman, ASHA workers, police and ANM of her area. On getting caught, the husband wanted to take Gita back to his house, but a brave Gita refused to return to her abusive marriage. Our feminist counselor Moon also supported Gita and she, along with an ASHA worker, rescued the baby girl to finally reunite mother and child. Community mobilisers like Moon made a huge difference by fearlessly responding to distress calls of women during the pandemic.

Winning justice for sexual abuse

Laitlin Lyngdoh is a NEN Outreach Worker from Nongshillong village, West Khasi Hills District. In 2018, she received one of her first cases as an Outreach Worker. It was a POCSO case, where a 9-year-old girl was sexually assaulted by her father. She immediately went to the village and although the people were reluctant to share with her what had happened, she calmly explained to them that she was there to help. She told them about POCSO Act and persuaded them to file an FIR. She assisted the survivor and her family members to the Primary Health Centre and took them to the Police Station as well. She also contacted the District Child Protection Unit for support. Inspite of threats from relatives of the perpetrator she did not give up. Multiple times, the mother had second thoughts and thought of withdrawing the case out of fear that she and her children will suffer. However, Kong Laitlin stood strong and supported the survivor and her family by visiting them often. She was determined to get justice for the girl. On February 2021, she received a phone call from the Women Police that a month ago, the perpetrator was sentenced to life in jail. It was all the reward she needed for her tremendous effort and patience.

From helpless to empowered

Konyiu Lohe is a farmer, home-based weaver of textiles, and makes processed food for a living. She explained, "I completed high school but could not continue as my parents could not afford expenses for all of us. Moreover, my step-father felt that it was not important to educate women. Therefore, the daughters in the family were compelled to quit school".

After getting introduced to SEWA by North East Network (NEN) she was trained as a Master Trainer to raise awareness campaign on Covid 19 and personal hygiene. She was selected for a leadership training in 2019 by NEN. Today, she is a Field Mobilizer of Self-Employed Women Association (SEWA) of Chizami range, an Agevan (meaning: A Leader) and the President of SEWA Nagaland.

"I am transformed as a person after working with NEN and SEWA with the opportunities and encouragement I have received. My vision is that all women will get equal opportunity to quality education and more space in decision making body in different institutions," says Konyiu.

Hope for families through livelihood initiatives for women

During the lockdown, Mamoni, from Guwahati, Assam was laid off by her master tailor. Her husband who worked in a pan masala factory also lost his job. The couple, who have a daughter preparing for school board exams, was struggling to make ends meet. Their landlord was harassing them for rent.

Meanwhile, NEN began an initiative for supporting disadvantaged women by distributing dry ration. NEN is extremely conscious to address multiple insecurities faced by women who have been disproportionately affected by the pandemic. We conceived the idea of engaging with women tailors like Mamoniby placing orders for stitching masks. Mamoni a strong-willed woman who was determined to provide for her child, joined this initiative by NEN. She stitched around 500 masks which enabled her to clear all dues with her landlord including paying off debts, her daughter's study expenses and the household was back on its feet again. Mamoni is keen to continue working with NEN which she sees as a light of hope.



Inspiring women and changing mindsets

When her husband got sick and bedridden for years, Ms.Neisepeu from Nagaland was left with the responsibility of taking care of her family. At that time she did not have employable skills nor enough land to grow their own food. She learned from her neighbors about weaving opportunities with Chizami Weaves. She challenged herself to learn weaving. Today she is one of the master weavers and earning a decent income that helps to support her family. As a master weaver, she teaches other weavers, and also assists in training programs organised by Chizami Weaves. Besides weaving, she also works as an agricultural labour whenever she gets the opportunity. Her husband, who is still recovering from his sickness, acknowledges her contribution at home and the family's income.

An Overview for 2020-21

Gender-Based Discrimination and Violence Against Women

Domestic violence cases increased alarmingly across North East India during the COVID-19 period as compared to the previous years.

The lockdowns and other social isolation measures implemented had forced women to be confined to their homes despite the fact

that they are subjected to violence, with limited or no social support options available. Very quickly we realised that to make a meaningful impact at a time of unprecedented turmoil and tragedy, we needed to diversify the scope of our operations.

In Assam, psycho-social counselling to survivors of violence became the need of the hour but providing counselling in our Gramin Mahila Kendras (GMK) became impossible during the lockdown. The aggrieved women were unable to visit GMKs for counselling. Despite everything, our barefoot counsellors attended distress calls and provided help to the women who required help through phone. During the lockdown period 32 women were provided counseling and support services.

Trapped inside their homes during lockdown with overwhelming responsibilities, women in the community felt helpless, isolated and worried. Our team, realising the need for alternative mediums, used the mobile phone and social media platforms to create awareness on domestic violence and on COVID-19. We uploaded and shared posters with information on COVID-19 and VAW along with our helpline numbers through different social media platforms, both locally and nationally.

Once the lockdown was lifted, in a bid to address the rise in severe mental health issues especially amongst women, NEN organised a workshop for peer leaders. This workshop acted as a safe space for the peer leaders to ventilate their bottled up feelings and emotions. Rural women in Assam are mostly unaware of internet usage and phone based technologies. We took the lockdown as an opportunity to teach these women technical skills that would keep them connected with the world.









NEN organised an online phone photography workshop with 15 community mobilisers, associate community mobilisers and peer leaders from 3 districts. They documented gendered division of labour experienced in their lives. We celebrated World Photography Day on 19th August by uploading 10 pictures by the women on NEN's website and social media pages.



Peer leaders from Kamrup and Darrang attended a one day workshop at NEN Guwahati office, on Impact of COVID-19 on Women and Farmer's Bills. The workshop focused on the impact of COVID-19 on different aspects of women's lives.



Youth engagement and leadership is vital for hastening and sustaining the prevention and ending of violence against young women and girls. We worked with young boys and girls in select districts of Assam to identify and build a core group of youth, build their confidence so that they can become change-agents and play a positive role in changing their communities. Gender sensitisation workshops along with poster making workshop was held for youth in different districts of Assam. We engaged youths in almost all of our campaigns and activities so that we have a group of peer leaders from the next generation who will actively sustain the campaign against VAW.

A workshop on gender-based discrimination was held for 40 students, at Doigrung Bagisa High School, Golaghat. The workshop explored gender and gender roles through various methods. The students appreciated the workshop and expressed that such a discussion had never taken place in the school before.



NEN organised an online Poster Making Workshop with 20 students from Darrang and Kamrup. Through the skills learned during this workshop, the students created posters on 'Gender Inequality and Ending gender-based Violence against Women and Girls' to celebrate the 'International Day of the Girl Child' on 11th October.

An important component of our work is ensuring that every person in the team understands what human rights are and their individual responsibilities. The NEN team in Assam underwent multiple trainings to enhance their capacities and skills. Due to restrictions in movement, most training sessions were held through interactive webinars. Some of the topics were 'Gender and the Changing World of Work' (Care work and the hidden labour of women; Gender-migration-work nexus), 'Rethinking Women's Movement: Questions from Contemporary Contexts, 'Gatekeepers Training on Domestic Violence', by Vimochana, Bangalore; 'Indian Cities and Nationwide Lockdown' by Youth for Unity and Voluntary Action (YUVA). In-person trainings of team were also conducted on PWDV Act, gender, patriarchy and basic communication skills.



In Meghalaya, cases of VAW and children intensified with the pandemic and the subsequent lockdowns. We collaborated with the Village Organisation of Laitkseh village, District Police, District Child Protection Unit, West Khasi Hills in raising awareness on the issue. This helped in accurately understanding the role of the Police and the DCPU in providing legal support and the role of the community in preventing and addressing the same at the village level.

It was clear that we needed accurate data to properly understand and also implement policy level advocacy. Hence, a 7- States rapid survey was conducted to understand the effective implementation of redressal mechanisms for domestic violence during the COVID-19 pandemic, as part of a national network of shelters-Lamlynti Chittara Neralu. The

findings of the study were posted in the organisation's social media handles. A paper titled 'Domestic violence survivors and their access to shelters: Experiences from northeast India' based on the findings of the study was presented at the 3days IAWS e- conference.

Health professionals have a responsibility to protect and promote human rights especially when it comes to survivors of abuse. NEN Meghalaya has been making consistent efforts to develop a health sector response to VAW.



Staff nurses of the Civil Hospital, Ri-Bhoi District were gender sensitised so that they develop an understanding about the importance of inculcating a sensitive approach towards survivors of violence.



12 women members of a Survivors Group were provided with livelihood training to enhance their skills on knitting and crochet as a means for them to attain economic independence.

The pandemic has brought with it an uncertain future for many youths. It has adversely affected the livelihood of many especially those in the creative fields. In an effort to provide local musicians with a platform to showcase their talent, an evening of youthful art and discourse was conducted

in Shillong. The programme created a platform for eminent artists from various backgrounds to share their personal journey as an artist, the obstacles they encountered and the passion they possess for their own art, encouraging young audiences to embrace their talent and use it to full potential.



Youth were trained and encouraged to use comic strips as a tool to address violations of women's rights, various social, political, cultural and environmental issues through drawings, comics and stories.



Youth groups and the DorbarShnong staged a public demonstration to protest against the sexual assault and murder of a woman in West Khasi Hills District demanding immediate arrest of the perpetrator and justice for the victim and her family.

In the wake of the Covid-19 pandemic in Nagaland, NEN doubled its efforts in addressing Gender Discrimination & Violence against Women and Girls through various awareness workshops, campaigns, and events to engage young people, women, and community leaders. Some of the key events included Global action of One Billion Rising, 16 days campaign on violence against women and International Women's Day that aimed at raising awareness on gender-based violence and foregrounding women's

contribution during the pandemic.

Various creative mediums such as poster drawing competitions, solidarity run to end Violence
Against Women, role play, dance performances, musical night and film making workshop were organised to create awareness and to inspire a call-to-action against GBV. Awareness on Sexual and Reproductive Rights, Personal Safety Education were held to emphasise on bodily integrity and creating safe spaces for young girls and women.



NEN Nagaland in collaboration with state agencies, NGOs and well-wishers distributed COVID relief in the form of dry rations, hygiene kits and sanitary products to women street vendor's and artisan's families.



With mentoring support from NEN, SEWA – an informal woman collective secured 5 vending sites and 80 permits to continue vending during the lockdown





More than 100 street vendors took part in a Street Awareness Campaign on International Street Vendors Day (ISVD) at Kohima, NEN articulated on The Nagaland Street Vendors (Protection of Livelihood and Regulation of Street Vending) Rules 2019 as part of the awareness campaign on its definition, provisions and function of Town Vending Committee TVCs.





In observance of the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence NEN Nagaland in collaboration with Chizami Sport Association (CSA) organised a 'Solidarity Run to end Violence against Women and Girls' in Chizami. NEN members along with 73 youth members from the villages 3 villages viz. Chizami, Enhulumi, Sumi and Chizami town participated in the run.



NEN Nagaland celebrated International Women's Day on March by bringing together rural women, village leaders and women collectives to celebrate women's leadership within their household and communities. A big part of NEN's work has been constant advocacy and working alongside the state Government to develop policies that created a safer society for women.

Although decades of women's movements by NEN have made unprecedented progress towards ending gender-based violence in Assam, chasms in legal frameworks remain. During Lockdowns in 2020, over 70 Shelter Homes in Assam were not accepting new residents in the absence of relevant guidelines for the Covid-19 pandemic. Upon receiving complaints NEN Assam swung into swift action and on 13th April 2020, we wrote an urgent appeal to the State's Social Welfare Department detailing the gaps in the States' response to pandemic, in the context of women's safety issues in both private and public spaces. As a result of NEN's constant advocacy with the Department of Social Welfare, Government of Assam, a SOP on women's access to shelter was issued by the Department. Assam was the first state to issue such an SOP and it came as a huge relief to institutional care providers and women. NEN Assam has also been made a part of the State Steering and Monitoring Committee under the scheme 'Women Helpline' which is constituted for ensuring a better and effective monitoring of the scheme.

A Women's Manifesto on Gender and Social Justice for the 2021 Assam Legislative Assembly election was developed by
NEN in collaboration with select feminist
organisations. The Women's Manifesto was
circulated amongst all the political parties
and they were requested to include the
demands in their party manifestos. It looked at
vulnerabilities of women in matters of safety,
their role in environment and economy apart
from their participation in political processes.
It highlighted in particular the disadvantages
faced by women from char, tea garden areas
and women with disability and different sexual
identities.

NEN made its submission to the Office of the OHCHR on COVID -19 and the increase of domestic violence against women through AMAN – Global Voices For Peace In The Home, a network of more than 100 women's organisations from India working on preventing domestic violence. NEN also submitted its recommendations on addressing domestic violence during the COVID-19 pandemic to NCW as a part of the AMAN network. NEN was part of a series of consultations along with other civil society organisations and women's groups and submitted its recommendation to NITI Aayog on COVID-19 and its impact on Women and Girls.

Women safety issues in State remain unaddressed: rights group

GUWAHATI, March 7: Even as the State gears up to observe International Women's Day, the concerns related to safety of women in public places and even in their own homes are largely unaddressed in Assam.

Expressing its concern at the rising number of crimes against women in the State, a women's rights group North East Network has called for collective action from home up to the policy-making level on incidents of crime against women.

"Assam has topped the chart of crimes against women in the country for the third consecutive year as per the NCRB report of 2019. The crime rate registered per lakh women population was 62.4 in 2019. However, the rate was \$8.8 in 2018. A comparison of National Family Health Survey (NFHS) 4 and NFHS 5 data showed that Karnataka, Sikkim and Assam saw the maximum rise in spousal violence in the last five years. There are many issues to be looked into, both from public responsibility and state accountability viewpoints," the North East Network said in an appeal to the Chief Secretary, government of Assam.

As acid attack cases are on the rise in Assam, posing a great concern regarding women's safety, the rights body drew attention of the authorities to a case reported from Bharalumukh here in September, 2020 and another incident in Dibrugarh in February, 2021.

"A Writ Petition was filed in the Gauhati High Court by North East Network and Nishamoni Borah, a survivor of acid attack. We are waiting to hear its status. It may be mentioned that the Supreme Court issued guidelines in 2013 to strictly monitor and regulate the sale of acid and undertake adequate publicity measures to ensure that the survivors of acid attack are able to access the provisions of the law aimed at aiding them. It is hoped that this petition will serve as a step towards ensuring that the State fulfills its responsibility of preventing such heinous crimes," Anurita Pathak Hazarika, State Co-ordinator of NEN told The Assam Tribune.

"We also need swift and sensitive action to implement the revised Victim Compensation Scheme, dated February 2019. Often the District Legal Services are plagued with fund crunch as learnt. This leads to delay in release of funds to victims which could lead to death and disability of the victim of acid attack. A regular coordination between the appropriate state departments and the district courts is very essential, with gender responsive officials," she added.

During and after the lockdown, Assam also witnessed a rise in domestic violence cases. NEN's Gramin Mahila Kendras recorded 27 such cases in three districts of Assam between April to July 2020. "We need independent Protection Officers (under the Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act) as District Social Welfare Officers are entrusted with multiple departmental duties, the petition stated.

"Women in workplaces remain unsafe in both formal and informal sectors. A NEN study in 2019 conducted in coordination with Gauhati University showed that 44.2 per cent working women faced sexual harassment in their workplaces in Assam. The local committees at the district level and internal committees in various workplaces must be formed with directives of and follow-up action by the State Nodal Agency," the women's rights group stated.

The NEN also advocated a State policy for women with adequate budgetary allocation, convergence of concerned departments and a dedicated task force with highly gender-sensitive individuals from both the government and the society.

On March 8th, NEN submitted an appeal to the Chief Secretary, Government of Assam with a set of demands to ensure safety of women especially in the context of acid attack, domestic violence, witch hunting, sexual harassment of women at work place, etc.



In Meghalaya, our outreach workers were trained to liaison with government departments to ensure that schemes and entitlements reach the beneficiaries. They joined forces with the Labour Department and State Resource Centre for Women in conducting an interface meeting with the people of the community. This interchange gave an in-depth understanding of schemes provided by the departments and the benefits that can be availed. Our outreach and community workers helped women labourers

submit applications for Schemes under the Meghalaya Building and Other Construction Workers Welfare Board as members. This gave them access for the first time to multiple services of maternity benefit, scholarship, loans, training, health insurance and pension. **NEN Outreach Workers have constantly** engaged with Government departments in increasing awareness on CAW and children and other social issues especially concerning increase in substance abuse among the younger population.



NEN collaborated with the Directorate of Social Welfare and CEHAT- Mumbai in capacitating the newly recruited OSC and existing SwadharGreh staffs across 8 districts of Meghalaya to inculcate feminists counselling skills, facilitate rehabilitation and support in a survivor centered manner while providing multi-sectoral responses to violence.

In Nagaland, NEN worked to help women get access to group membership, information and support via awareness on social security entitlements and livelihood. We worked hand in hand with tribal women organisations and SEWA an informal women's collective. With mentoring support from NEN, informal women collectives secured vending sites and permits to continue vending during the lockdown. Women grassroots leaders were trained to create awareness related to coronavirus,

psychosocial/mental health care, to promote practices, to minimise risks, and develop mechanisms to deal with the public health crisis as a result of the pandemic.

NEN have capacitated and enabled women leaders in SEWA Nagaland to be able to sit in the TVCs. Currently, there are 14 women members of SEWA Nagaland in Kohima, Dimapur, Shamator, Chumukedima TVC under Nagaland Street Vendors Rules 2019.

Natural Resource Management & Livelihood

The nationwide lockdown imposed by the Government of India and overall economic turmoil created by the COVID-19 crisis created compounded economic impacts that were felt especially by women and girls, who are mostly earning less, saving less, and holding insecure jobs, employed in non-essential sectors or are living close to poverty.

To overcome the challenges, we began training our weavers on the use of media/ social media platforms so that we could continue monitoring and provided them every support. Empowering them digitally was crucial so that we could connect and continue with our field activities. Highly challenging

was product collection- finding new orders and markets and responding to customers' needs. We devised new ways to connect with transport facilities and earned their goodwill. We continued to display our products online, appealing people to support NEN to sustain rural livelihoods and inculcate the philosophy of purchasing local handwoven products and thus support weaver's families.

After the Lockdown, we brought together peer leaders and discussed with them the 3 Farmers Bills passed by the government and how it would affect farmers all over the country especially women.



We trained weavers on product diversification and quality control across the districts of Karbi Anglong, Darrang, Udalguri, Kamrup (R) and Sonitpur. Other trainings covered

important subjects viz. bookkeeping, inventory management, sessions product pricing, stock keeping, monitoring tools and documentation of the entire production cycle.











Weavers from different districts were given exposure visits to The Green Hub and NEN

Guwahati Office, to familiarise them to the different thematic areas covered by NEN.





Farmers from Assam and Meghalaya attended a 3-day training in organic farming in Pabhoi Greens, Biswanath, Assam, between November and March 2020. This residential training camp included sessions on introduction to organic farming methods and concepts such as preparation of bio-fertilisers and vermi-compost, seed germination, sustainable pisciculture, cutting and grafting, preservation of organic and indiaenous variety of seeds etc.

meghalaya

In Meghalaya, the social structure is matrilineal and women at the village level play exceptional roles as workers and leaders in the community; however, they receive little to no recognition.

To address such issues, women weavers from 3 villages in the Ri-Bhoi District were trained or several crucial skills of a leader, facilitating the understanding of the importance of women's

role in leadership and encouraging women to nurture alliances to foster exchange of learning. Additionally, they were also imparted with knowledge on financial literacy.

Weaving as an art and an occupation has seen a drastic decline among the younger generation and to ensure its preservation, it is crucial to engage young people to take it up.



Young women from 3 villages in the Ri-Bhoi District were capacitated and enhanced on traditional weaving practices integrating traditional motifs that forms the basis of their identity as a community.

Youth have an inportant role to play in environmental conservation and they have been at the centerstage of our conservation work. Youth trained by NEN in Rohbah village, initiated nature walks with children, and adolescents as a first step to understanding the flora and fauna species that inhabits their villages and forests. These nature walks encourage discussion among young people to understand the need to preserve our fores and mother earth.

Women farmers' skills on agro-ecological farming practices were enhanced through an intensive training at Pabhoi Greens, Assam and a cross learning exposure to Nangkyrsoi SHG at Khweng village associated with

NESFAS encouraging learning through first hand experience and inculcating in them the importance of being self-sustainable by building startups of their own. We also partnered with the MAKAAM for a survey on the 'Impact of COVID-19 on women in farming and allied sector' with 10 grassroot women trained as enumerators and further interviewed 50 women farmers for the study.

During the pandemic, we witnessed that children in urban areas were confined to their homes with their gadgets. An outreach worker initiated the idea of setting up a kitchen garden to help them comprehend its advantages.



Children were imparted with basic skills of agriculture and to inculcate and understand that food can be grown in small spaces too. Germination activity allowed children to see life grow before their very eyes, teaching them to be nurturers and helping them understand the need to be able to grow one's food and to protect what comes with it i.e., soil, water and the surrounding environment. It also encouraged the participants to practice seed keeping as it is the inception of any life form on earth.

In Nagaland, NEN engaged with women who were farmers, vendors and artisans. We worked with youth and community leaders in safeguarding and preserving community natural resources; indigenous food & farming systems; and traditional weaving & textiles. Building alliances with state agencies and networks such as MINI and MAKAAM were central to our advocacy efforts on indigenous

food and farming systems. At the community level, we strived to strengthen food security and nutrition, along with sustainable livelihoods. We concentrated on community seed banks, on-farm support for women millet farmers; organising biodiversity festival to showcase the rich and diverse agro produce of local communities, and building solidarity in conservation action.

To bridge the gap between youth and farming, events such as the World Food Day, Youth for Indigenous Food System campaign and film screenings were organised to emphasise the importance of sustainable food and farming system in the wake of the pandemic. Youths were engaged to join in biodiversity walks, cooking competitions, bamboo crafting, photography and bio-mapping/resource mapping and storytelling.



Seeds of Hope

The establishment of Community Seed Banks (CSB) had enabled the Phor community of Phek District in reviving some lost seeds. While sorting through seeds to store in the seed bank, the CSB members of Phor found the seeds of black foxtail millet, two sticky rice seeds, and three non sticky rice seeds which were lost from the community. What an incredible discovery!

medium to engage young people to depict their artistic interpretation of abuse/violence and strength of survivors to come out of it. Young boys and girls were involved to enact and raise awareness on the existence of DV in their area encouraging people to report and support survivors.



NEN's effort in addressing environmental concerns started with the youth in Rohbah village, where 4 youths were trained on photography skills. As part of World Photography Day, photographs captured by these youths were displayed on social media. These photographs captured the flora and fauna species found in their villages and issues related to environmental conservation.



Food forms the basis of our indigenous identity andacts as a platform for every action we take for the future .On World Food Day, a 'Nutritional Indigenous Food Display' was conducted to highlight indigenous cuisines, creating awareness on the significance of indigenous food and the health benefits they possess and most importantly to understand the interconnectedness between preserving forests, our identity and food.



Rural women play a crucial role in enhancing agricultural & rural development and the amassed contribution they have made towards the society. On International Day of Rural Women, we celebrated by creating a platform for rural women to understand their longstanding vital role as custodians of nature, keepers of traditional knowledge and key agents to food security resonating with the theme 'Building rural women's resilience during Covid-19.

Nationwide Campaign

"If We Do Not," Rise

(29th August - 2nd October, 2020)

The nationwide 'If We Do Not Rise" campaign to safeguard the Indian Constitution and its values was co-ordinated by NEN, for the Northeast chapter. NEN also co-hosted 5 webinars – i) Readdress Environmental Violation: Voices rise from Northeast India; ii) Citizenship issues and vulnerable groups; iii) Violence against Women: A protracted pandemic within a pandemic; iv)Tea-time – The story behind; and v) We rise, we speak, we resolve: Young voices of resilience from Northeast India.



International Women's Day

8th March, 2021

In Dhemaji, placards with feminist slogans were displayed in public places and a sports event was held for community women in which 59 women participated.

In Dharikati, weavers and village women attended a discussion on the significance of IWD, followed by team building activities. An informal sharing of stories also took place. Many expressed their joy at having the rare opportunity to spend leisure time with fellow women, especially in the context of the COVID and social distancing norms.



In Darrang, Kamrup, Udalguri and Golaghat, ASHA workers in each of the districts were felicitated and honoured for their tremendous contribution as frontline workers during the COVID-19 lockdown.



On the occasion of International Women's Day, 7 members of the NEN youth collective, developed a skit on witch-hunting and performed a street play to raise awareness on the issue and its impact on the community. At the end of the play, these members of the youth collective pledged to continue their fight and, also urged the audience to join hands in preventing GBDVAW.



In West Khasi Hills District, we felicitated grassroot women leaders who are warriors of their personal life and courageous leaders of their communities. They have challenged gender stereotypical norms to maintain peace and harmon in their villages.



In Ri-Bhoi District. communities came together for cultural performances self -composed song on the pivotal role they play in uplifting their community. A short skit was also performed portraying the role that gender played in unequal access for women to job opportunities. The programme saw the participation of the Deputy Commissioner of the Nonapoh and the DDM of NABARD, Ri-Bhoi.

International Women's Day was organised by NEN Nagaland in collaboration with Yimchungeberu Arihako Shamator Area (YBASA), Pochury Mothers Association (PMA), SEWA Nagaland, Phekerkriema Unit. IWD events took place across 3 districts viz. Chizami-Phek, Phekeriekriema-Kohima & Shamator-Tuensang. The occasion brought together rural women, women collectives, village leaders and govt. officials to celebrate women's leadership within their household and communities. The highlights of the events were folk songs performances, extempore speech competition, film screening and basket weaving training.

On the occasion of IWD, Ms. Nuzovolu - a Home Based Worker and a leader of SEWA Nagaland was awarded by USAID for exemplifying "She is a Leader" for supporting street vendors in reclaiming their right to work during the pandemic.



Green HUB

The Green Hub Project is an innovative youth and community based video
Fellowship programme by NEN and Dusty
Foot Foundation that was launched in
2015 exclusively for the youth of NER. The immensely successful project engages youth in conservation action and social change across the region through the use of digital medium. In the past 5 years, we have had
88 fellows who have successfully completed the fellowship and are now undertaking conservation projects in their own regions.

Green Hub Fellowship 2021

The application process for the Green Hub

Fellowship 2020–21 had started by December 2019, however, due to the COVID–19 pandemic and the nation–wide lockdown, the year was considered as a gap year. For 2021–2022, applications were invited again. Adding the shortlisted applicants from both years, the Jury finally selected 21 fellows from all the 8 states of NER. In 2020, several online sessions were conducted with the alumni that included Sound workshop, Story–telling workshop, Wildlife Filmmaking workshop etc. Online sessions are being planned with the fellows of the current batch and resource persons of the Green Hub Fellowship.







In the month of July, Green Hub started a new project called the Pitch 4 Video Story, wherein hundred 2-minute films around the pandemic are being made with communities across Northeast on 4 specific categories- i) COVID Resilience; ii) COVID & Wildlife, Forests & Forest Fringe Communities; iii) Stories of Communities impacted by COVID 19 (Migrant Labour, Artisans etc.); and iv) Innovative Communication on COVID.

While the Fellowship had to be halted because of the pandemic, this year has been very eventful for Green Hub. From January to March 2021, the team was overseeing a project called Choukhat Ki Goonj in collaboration with Anahad Foundation. Chaukat Ki Goonj, which is an initiative of the Anahad Foundation, has

been providing financial help to artists who were affected by the COVID-19 crisis. The musicians had to record a 30-minutes live session of their performance and send it to Anahad, for which they received a support of INR 2000 per artist per group. In the northeast region, the project was carried out through the Green Hub network. The Team were able to reach out to 34 groups and 199 individuals from 6 states of the Northeast i.e., Arunachal Pradesh, Assam, Mizoram, Tripura, Nagaland, and Meghalaya.

In 2020 Green Hub came together with Studio Nilima, an action based research collective based in Guwahati, to initiate a pilot fellowship for 6 months to support 2 Green Hub fellows in building their capacities in research initiatives. Jahnu Baruah and Seela Lepcha of batch 2019-2020 were selected for this fellowship.

Serlibon Timungpi (Batch 2016-2017) was selected for a fellowship related to women and the Forest Rights Act, 2006. The fellowship that was powered by MAKAAM, and Amhi Amchya Arogyasathi required her to build capacities of indigenous women and create awareness on the Forests Rights Act 2006.

The javiko Chase (Batch 2019-2020) is working as a Junior Project Fellow with ATREE on a coffee table book on edible insects of Nagaland and also creating some documentary films on the same.

Our alumnus Arghadeep Baruah (Batch 2016-2017) along with Riaz Ahmed, a member from the music band Bottle Rockets India, got the opportunity to be a part of the Anahad Fellowship in 2021. This fellowship aims to cultivate deep expertise in cultural development and production skills by supporting fellows over a period of 3 months and 5 states across India.

The Green Hub team was also a part of the Lok Swasthya Sewa Trust initiated series of training on COVID awareness along with the teams of NEN Nagaland, Meghalaya and Assam.

In May 2020, an initiative to save pangolins in Karbi Anglong, and West Karbi Anglong districts were taken as we were informed that hunting activities in the region had increased. On ground the activities have been taken up by Green Hub alumni Serlibon Timungpi, Joyhind Engleng and Moniram Teron along with their youth groups. Currently they are creating awareness via virtual medium.

- Two Green Hub films were screened at the Rising Garden Films Festival, 2021 organized by One Billion R'ising South Asia, Sangat and Kriti Film Club. The films were "Saving the Millets" and Strength in Diversity" made by fellows Chakseng T. Sangma and Chentei Lam Khiamniungan Naga (GH Fellow, Batch 2017-2018) respectively.
- At a special online film screening conducted by the Wildlife Conservation Trust, 2021, three Green Hub films were screened namely, "Guardians of Dampa Narpuh Wildlife Sanctuary"—"Saving the Last Refuge" and "Balpakram - Mystical Land of the Eternal Winds".
- Our alumnus, Wanmai Konyak (Batch 2015-2016) of Nagaland, was given the 8th Eastern Himalayan Conservation Award, 2020 by Balipara Foundation for his work in biodiversity conservation and documentation.

Women's Manifesto by rights groups for Assam assembly polls











Guwahati, Mar 18 (PTI) Increased reservation for women in elected bodies, adequate security for them to earn their livelihoods, equitable economic participation, better health and education facilities are among the major highlights that women rights groups in Assam have demanded from political parties contesting the assembly election.

The "Womens Manifesto-2021", prepared by five organizations working in the field of gender equality have put forward their demands to political parties and contesting candidates so that they recognise the issues faced by women and include these in their plan and promises during campaigning and include them in the list once elected, North East Network (NEN) State Coordinator Anurita Pathak Hazarika said.

The manifesto is a collective process through which women from various backgrounds and social groups have come together to draw attention to the gaps that exist in attaining gender equality and development in Assam*, she said.

The manifesto has been prepared by NEN, Purba Bharati Educational Trust (PBET), Women in Governance (WinG), Women's Leadership Training Centre (WLTC) and Xobdo, Assam.

The priority of the elected representatives must be to ensure that the Women Reservation Bill is passed immediately and 33 per cent reservation for women candidates in the legislative assembly and Parliament was assured, WITC's Banamallika Choudhury said.

Women safety issues in State remain unaddressed: rights group

GUNGAHATI, March 7: Even as the State gears up to observe international Women's Day, the concerns related to safety of women in public places and even in their own homes are largely unaddressed in Assam.

Expressing its concern at the rising number of crimes against women in the State, a women's rights group North East Network has called for collective action from home up to the policy-making level on incidents of crime against women

"Assum has topped the chart of crimes against women in the country for the third consecutive year as per the NCSS report of 2019. The crime rate registered per laich women population was 62.4 in 2019. However, the rate was 58.8 in 2018. A comparison of National Family Health Survey (NFRS) 4 and NFRS 5 data showed that Karsataka, Sikkim and Assam saw the maximum rise in spousal violence in the lost five years. There are many issues to be looked into, both from public responsibility and state accountability viewpoints," the North East Network said in an appeal to the Chief Secretary, government of Assam.

As orld ottack cases are on the rise in Assom, posing a prest concern regarding women's eafety, the rights body drew amention of the authorities to a case reported from Bhanalamakh here in September, 2020 and another incident in Dibracorh in February, 2021.


"A Writ Petition was filed in the Gouhoti High Court by North East Network and Nishamoni Boroh, a survivor of acid amack. We are waiting to bear its status. It may be mentioned that the Supreme Court issued guidelines in 2013 to strictly monitor and regulate the sale of oxid and undertake adequate publicity measures to ensure that the survivors of oxid attack are able to access the previsions of the law almed at aiding them. It is hoped that this petition will serve as a step towards ensuring that the State fulfils its responsibility of preventing such belinous crimes," Asserts Porhole Hopprike. State Co-ordinator of NEN sold The Assess Tribune

"We also need swift and sensitive action to implement the revised Victim Compensation Scheme, dated February 2019, Other the District Legal Services are plagued with fund crunch as learnt. This leads to delay in release of funds to victims which could lead to death and disability of the victim of acid attack. A regular coordination between the appropriate state departments and the district courts is very essential, with gender responsive officials," she added.

During and after the lockdown, Assum also witnessed a rise in domestic violence cases. NEN's Gramin Mobile Kendras recorded 27 such cases in three districts of Assom between April to July 2022. "We need independent Protection Officers (under the Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act) as District Social Welfare Officers are entrusted with multiple departmental duties, the petition

"Momen in workplaces remain ansafe in both formal and informal sectors. A NEN study in 2019 conducted in coordination with Southers University showed that 44.2 per cent working women foced sexual horosomers in their worknings in Asson. The local committees at the district level and internal committees in various workplaces must be formed with directives of and follow-up action by the State Nodal Agency," the women's rights group stated.

The NEN also advocated a State policy for women with adequate budgetary allocation, convergence of concerned departments and a dedicated task force with highly gender-sensitive individuals from both the government and the society.

Speedy probe demanded into teacher's rape, murder

GUWAHATI, July 9: Women's rights group North East Network (NEN) has demanded a speedy investigation into the alleged rape and murder of a teacher of Balipara Krishak Mukti High School in Udalguri, who was found dead on July 7.

The organisation has also demanded a compensation of

Rs 5 lakh to the victim's family under the Assam Victim Compensation Scheme, 2012, vide the order of the Governor of Assam, dated February

In a memorandum to the Udalguri Superintendent of Police, the organisation strongly condemned the brutal incident and demanded an immediate and impartial inquiry into it.

"It is a gross violation of women's human rights. Realising the gravity of the offence, we demand an immediate inquiry into the matter so that the accused is arrested without further delay and booked for exemplary punishment," **NEN State director Anurita** Hazarika and NEN community mobiliser of Udalguri, Dipali Bora stated.


