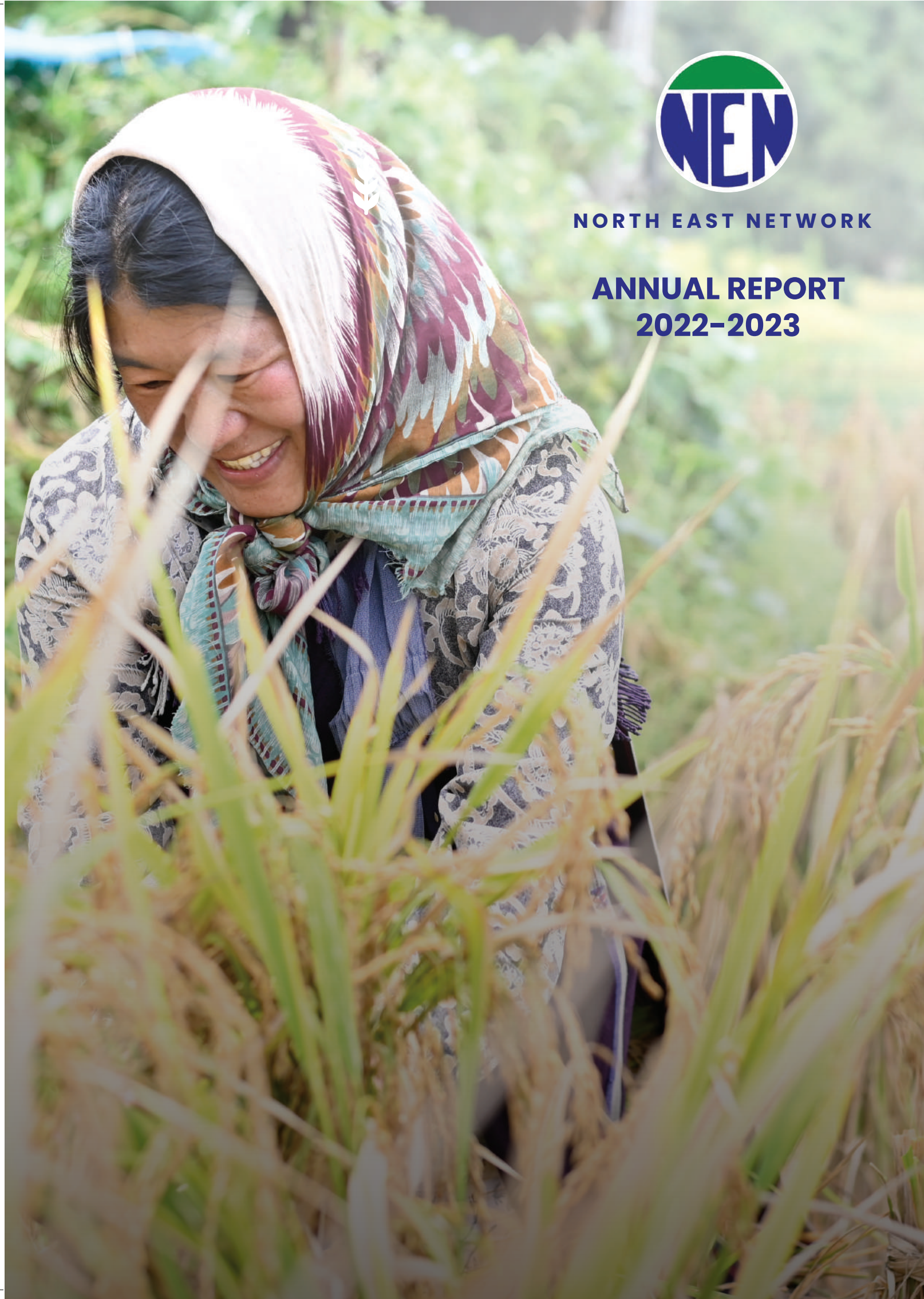

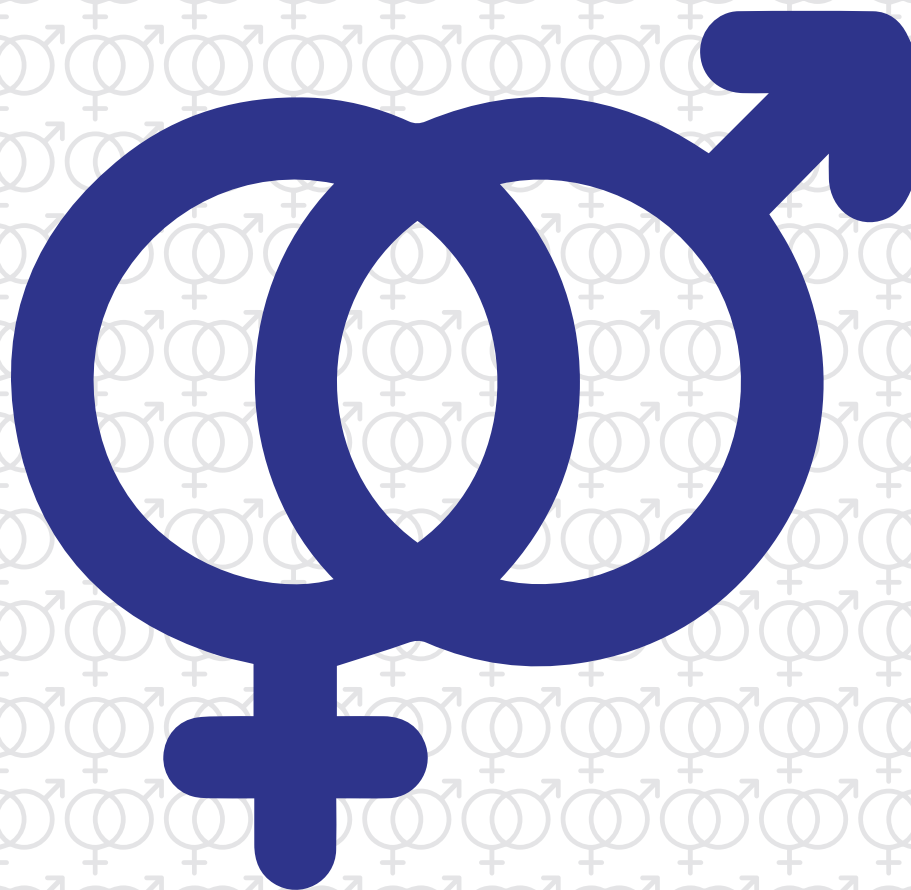

GENDER-BASED DISCRIMINATION AND VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

Gender-based discrimination and violence against women (GBDVAW) exist in private, work, and public places, leading to a gross violation of women's right to life. NEN actively addresses and redresses gender-based violence (GBV) against women and girls in urban and rural communities. NEN strategises and implements global campaigns locally, engages government agencies through programmes and meetings and mobilises women, youth, and community members to join the movement.

Grassroots Feminist Convention towards Transformational Leadership



The event at Guwahati brought together 139 grassroots women leaders, field mobilisers, farmers, artists, weavers, barefoot counsellors, survivors of GBV, and youth. The event featured an exhibition, the release of three publications, a cultural function, and three-panel discussions on 'Collective Public Responsibility to end GBDVAW', 'Women and Agriculture in the Context of Climate Change,' 'Towards a Resilient Future: Role of Youth,' and 'Social Media, Crime against Women and State Response in Assam.' Young members of the Prayas Youth Collective of Gramin Mahila Kendra (GMK) conducted a survey to understand GBDVAW faced by three generations of women in Kamrup and Golaghat districts. They performed a street play and demonstrated posters with the message to end GBV.

Strengthening the Ecosystem to address GBV



NEN strengthens support services for women facing GBV and creates a pool of resources at the district level. In this light, a Training of Trainers on enhancing facilitation skills to address GBDVAW was organised for 22 mid-level functionaries from 9 organisations representing 14 districts, including NEN and GMK. Seema Sreenivas and Gargee Guha from Swayam, Kolkata, facilitated the workshop. In addition, NEN has created a Feminist Lawyers Pool in which eight lawyers from four districts are undergoing capacity-building training and participating in workshops to examine laws from a feminist perspective. After completing the training, the lawyers take up GBV cases referred by NEN.

MEGHALAYA



NEN's Community Support Centres serve as safe spaces for women survivors of violence in East and Eastern West Khasi Hills districts. These centres offer emotional support, counselling, and access to capacity-building programmes focused on livelihood initiatives. NEN and its Outreach Workers (ORWs) established a Joint Action Committee with women peer leaders from Nongshillong, Mawkohngei, Wahliewlong, Khartein, Umkrem and Mawlai Syiem in Eastern West Khasi Hills district. In a recent incident, an abandoned newborn child at a tourist spot immediately drew the community's attention. Women from six neighbouring villages contacted NEN's ORWs for assistance, forming a women's task force to oversee the area and address VAW&C in their respective villages.

NAGALAND



As part of the 16 Days Campaign, an outreach programme was organised to sensitise 9 communities on Child Sexual Abuse (CSA) through the Personal Safety Education Programme (PSEP), normalising menstruation, and reproductive health with children, youths, community elders and leaders in Phek and Shamator districts.

Under the NEN Youth Leadership Programme's community initiative, NEN trained youth from Pfutsero, initiated PSEP awareness programmes via community platforms. NEN uses creative tools to build leadership skills in young people from rural areas and provide a platform for conversations on gender equity and peace-building issues. The 'Ultimate Frisbee' initiative involved youths from Chizami, Chizami town and Razeba villages in August 2022 at Chizami.

VOICES FROM THE FIELD

Breaking Free, Rima's Journey of Resilience

15-year-old Rima (name changed) worked in a private company in Mirza, Kamrup (rural), to support her family. During this time, she fell in love with a boy from a nearby village and eloped with him. However, her dreams quickly shattered as she became a victim of abuse by her partner and in-laws, leading her to abandon her job.

Rima's mother, a member of a Support Group initiated by GMK, Kamrup, discovered the violence her daughter was facing and reached out for help. At first, Rima struggled to find her voice, but after several counselling sessions conducted by Barefoot counsellors at GMK, Rima opened up. The sessions proved transformative and empowered her to recognise her rights and build resilience.

Rima worked as a child caregiver for a family in Guwahati. Her dedication and sincerity impressed her employers, encouraging her to continue her studies. Rima appeared in the last Higher Secondary examination in 2023 and remains hopeful to rise above her struggles and pursue her dreams.

The children from Rilang Shelter Home and Reach Shillong Ministries Open Day Shelter commemorated Human Rights Day with the theme 'Pictorial Representation of Human Rights by Children' to express their understanding and perspective of a just society.

176 participants attended public awareness campaigns on GBVAW with Nenterprise. 310 participants attended the PSEP that normalised menstruation, reproductive health and sensitised members on Child Sexual Abuse (CSA).

City youth artists performed Western and Khasi traditional songs in a 'Musical Concert' at All Saints Hall, Shillong, to express their resistance against GBDVAW.

NAGALAND



41 youths participated in the Ultimate Frisbee game organised by NEN and Chizami Sports Association, and 20 youths collaborated with local youth groups in an Ultimate Frisbee tournament during the global OBR campaign. 180 children and youths participated in public awareness campaigns like – the ‘Wall of Freedom’ painting for Self-Expression, ‘Mobile Library’ to encourage young readers, ‘Period Talks’ to understand and normalise menstruation, ‘Art Exhibition’ on GBVAW; and game booths to create awareness on body positivity and personal safety for young children.

NAGALAND



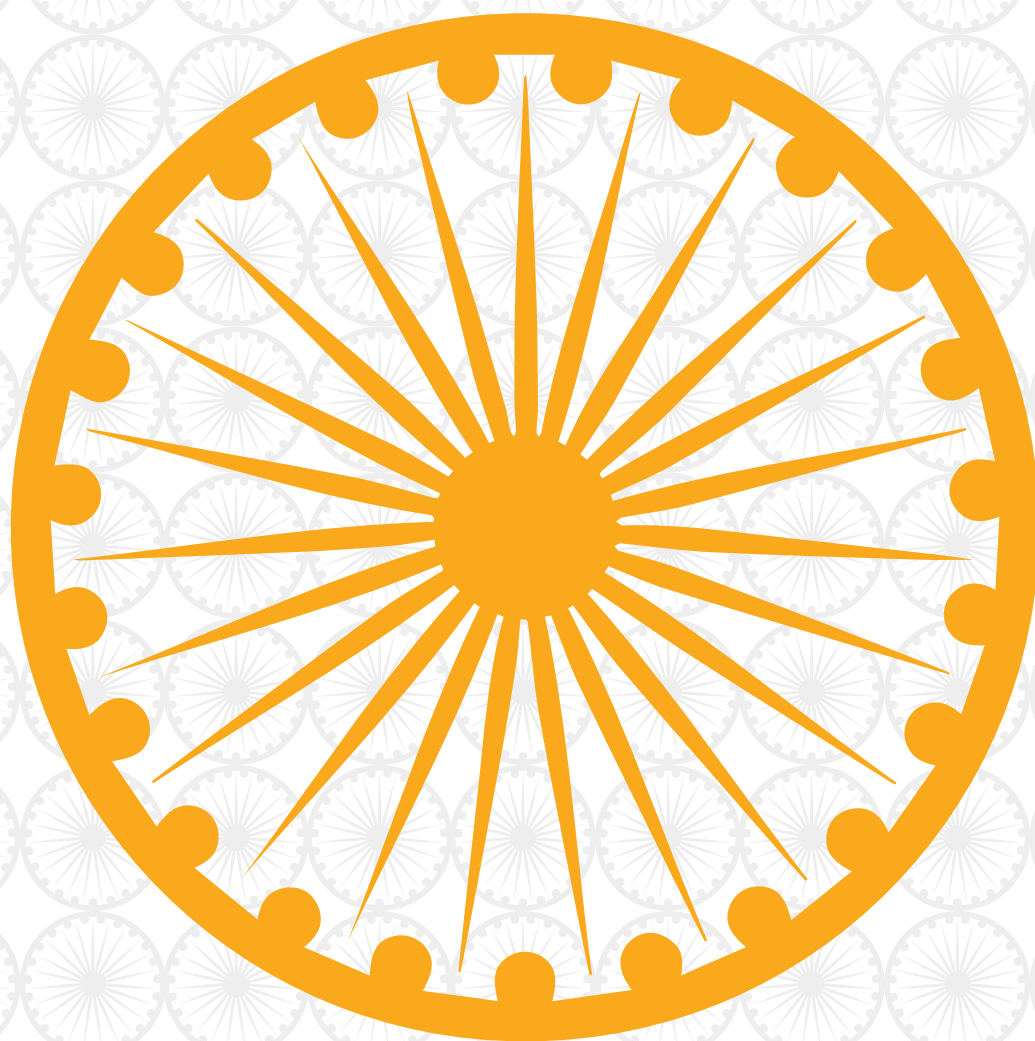

NEN identifies and addresses gaps and challenges within the system and fosters meaningful interactions with different agencies for gender-sensitive implementation of laws, policies, schemes, and services. NEN strengthens access to state entitlements, increases women's participation in local governance mechanisms and fosters robust relationships between parties.

Government Collaborations



NEN and the District Social Welfare Office, Kamrup district, organised an interface cum workshop into the gendered aspects of the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition, and Redressal) Act, 2013, and the Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act, 2005. The collaboration extended to government agencies, i.e., the Social Welfare Department, Mahila Shakti Kendras, and national networks such as Aman and Lam-Lynti Chittara Neralu (LCN). The workshop was inaugurated by Shehnab Sahin, District Social Welfare Officer (i/c) and was attended by 36 government personnel, comprising stakeholders from various sectors, such as Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS), Child Development Project Officer (CDPO), One Stop Centre (OSC), Mahila Shakti Kendra (MSK), Block Development Officer (BDO), shelter homes, service providers, Gaon Panchayat, local committees, and NGOs.

'Letter of Concern on State-drive Campaign' on Prevention of Child Marriage

NEN, as an active member of the Alliance of Feminist Collective, Assam, submitted a Letter of Concern to the Juvenile Justice Committee of Gauhati High Court. The letter by the Alliance voiced concerns about the critical gendered impact on women and young girls, as a result of the ongoing drive against child marriage under the Prohibition of Child Marriage Act, 2006 and the POCSO Act. Furthermore, the letter emphasised the need to enhance access to adolescent-friendly sexual and reproductive health information, services, and mental well-being support.

MEGHALAYA

Collaborative Actions to ensure Gender-Sensitive Response for Women and Children Survivors of Violence by State Agencies



NEN orchestrated comprehensive programmes for Civil Hospital, Nongpoh, of Ri-Bhoi District and Swadhar Greh staff in Nongstoin, West Khasi Hills District. The programmes included,

- A capacity-building programme for health care providers of Civil Hospital, Nongpoh, Ri-Bhoi District.
- A study visit to the Centre of Enquiry for Health and Allied Themes (CEHAT) 'Dilaasa' Centre in Mumbai for five health care providers of Civil Hospital, Nongpoh, Ri-Bhoi District.
- A 'Training of Trainers' programme for health care providers from PHC, CHC and Civil Hospital, Ri-Bhoi District.
- Knowledge and skills training of officials from the Swadhar Greh shelter home of Nongstoin, West Khasi Hills District by NEN and LCN, a national network on strengthening women's access to shelter.

The efforts led to a core group of health care providers who address the needs of survivors in diverse departments and units was established.

Quality Child Care for All



A two-day regional consultation programme with the Self-Employed Women's Association (SEWA) recognised childcare as a fundamental right for informal women workers. The programme attended by the Social Welfare Department, Meghalaya, and various organisations from different parts of North East Region addressed the need to equip Anganwadi centres with adequate resources, transforming them into quality crèches-cum-daycare centres for child survivors. Extending Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) hours and incorporating diverse activities were vital aspects of this initiative. As a result, the NE Regional Task Force was formed, with a relentless commitment to implement comprehensive, full-day, and holistic quality childcare services.

NAGALAND

NEN Collaborative Engagements with State Agencies

Since 2021, NEN and the Department of Women Resource Development (WRD) have collaborated and conducted community-based livelihood training programmes at the Women Resource Centre in Runguzu Nasa, Phek district. WRD recognised NEN's significant contribution towards empowering women and extended its support for women-centric programmes for the next three years through the Women Resource Centre.

NEN Youth Leadership Programme (NYLP)



NEN launched NYLP to empower community youth through perspective and skill-building sessions. The programme encouraged youths to address critical community issues such as waste management, child sexual abuse prevention, bamboo sustainability, water challenges, education quality enhancement, and improving relationships between parents, teachers, and students in schools.



VOICES FROM THE FIELD

Breaking Barriers

An empowered NEN-trained community worker from Rymbai, East Jaintia Hills District, Meghalaya, proactively conducted a need assessment survey in the village and discovered that most women were confined to homemaking roles and inactive SHGs.

To foster women's agency, the community worker and NEN collectivised these women and empowered them with knowledge of their rights, entitlements, labour rights, and digital accessibility to health and nutrition. The women gained awareness of the OSCs and their services. They were exposed to the NEN Resource Centre and Women Tailoring Collective Centre in East Khasi Hills, bolstering their knowledge for increased participation and sustainable livelihoods. As a result of this initiative, women actively engaged and successfully registered under the Labour Department, which provided them access to various schemes and services for themselves and their children.

NATURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT & LIVELIHOOD

NEN engages with diverse stakeholders in empowering women farmers and youth to sustain, conserve, and promote biodiversity and natural ecosystems. Comprehensive mobilisation, capacity building, and various training enable women to play a crucial role in natural resource-based livelihoods. NEN supports women collectives to initiate successful livelihood initiatives and businesses in food and agro-based activities, textile weaving, and crafts.

Community Seed Banks



NEN has revitalised traditional weaving and farming systems in select districts, empowering community women with sustainable rural livelihoods and fostering leadership on food sovereignty, seed conservation, and agroecology through training and workshops. 45 women peer leaders were trained on the global politics of food and seeds and their impact on local food systems. This training has initiated the process of setting up Community Seed Banks (CSB) in select districts under 'Building Transformational Leadership - Towards Equitable and Sustainable Change' programme.

Journey of Learning

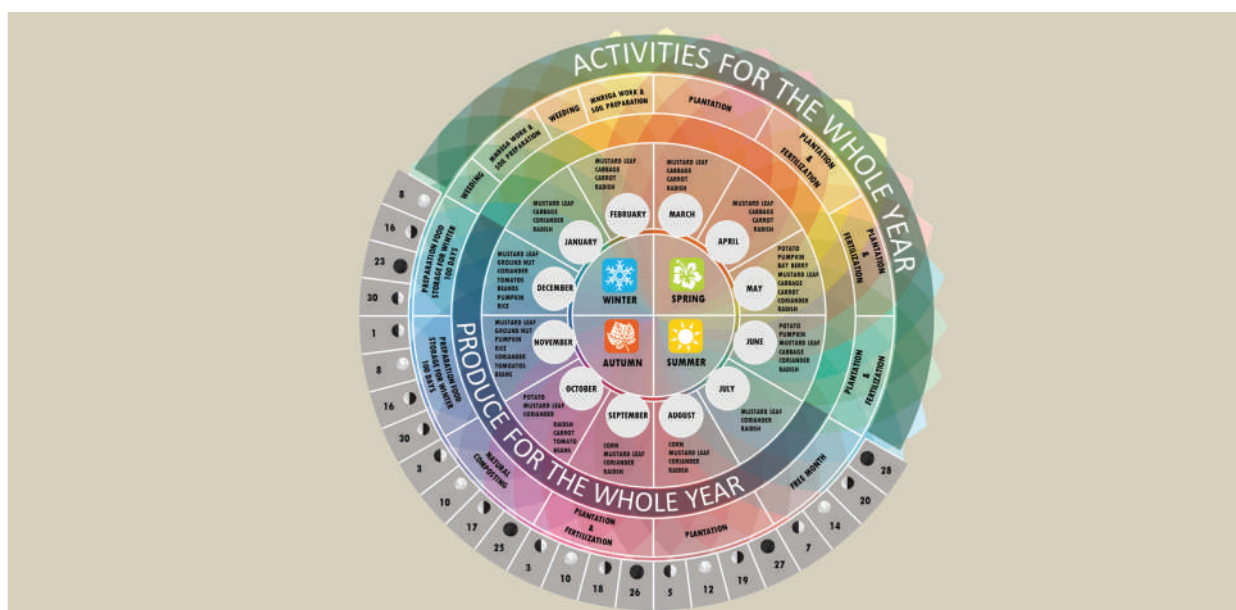


NEN conducted two impactful events in Goalpara and Golaghat districts, encompassing eight villages, bringing more than 300 participants. Crucial issues such as the adverse environmental impact of mono plantations, human-elephant conflict and its effects on food security, and the significance of sustainable farming were thoughtfully addressed. Film screenings, photo exhibitions, folk songs, dances, 'Performed Conversations' by Papari Medhi, and sharing experiences by village elders and women drove the importance of these matters.

A Survey on Changing Patterns of Climate & Livelihoods

NEN conducted a comprehensive survey across 7 districts, involving 1191 farmers, including 670 women and 521 men. The survey focused on the impact of climate change on rural livelihoods and farming practices over the past decade. It particularly highlighted concerns related to seed quality, water availability, crop productivity, and soil health.

MEGHALAYA Seasonality Calendar



NEN facilitated the creation of a Seasonality Calendar by women farmers in Nongshillong Village, Eastern West Khasi Hills District. Drawing upon their indigenous wisdom, women farmers referred to the moon calendar to discern the most auspicious time for planting crops and recorded their activities throughout the year. The calendar also created awareness about the often unacknowledged contributions of women to family incomes. It revealed the extensive and demanding labour women undertook in agriculture and farming and their significant role in managing household chores and childcare responsibilities.

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Engagements with Different Collectives

NEN's engagement with different stakeholders and their work with farming collectives has widened their work scope and helped them achieve their larger goal of creating a gender-just society. The Meluri Millet Sisters and the SEWA Unit Shamator Town are examples where millet farming and organising millet festivals are commendable activities. These activities have created space for the women farmers to share their concerns, experiences, indigenous food and farming systems and network with different organisations, community leaders, government departments and administration through these festivals.

Community Seed Bank(CSB)



NEN collaborated with farming communities to establish CSB models to maintain, preserve, promote, and make local seed varieties available. The joint efforts have yielded remarkable results, gaining support and recognition from the community and the Government. An excellent example of this success is the CSB, led by women farmers in Rusoma Village, Kohima district, which received recognition since its inception in 2021. The village council provided space in the old village council office for the women farmers to set up a seed bank and showcase their work during the annual village general meetings and the Orange Festival. CSB has displayed and sold seeds for two consecutive years, raised awareness about Indigenous foods, and participated in biodiversity festivals and state-level events for women farmers.



VOICES FROM THE FIELD

The Millet Sisters



Since 2012, NEN Nagaland and the Millet Network of India (MINI) worked with women farmers to revive and promote millet-based biodiversity farming. The Meluri Millet Sisters Collective, one of the 8 collectives with 16 members under the Phek district, formed in 2017, marked a significant step towards creating awareness, promoting, and conserving millet-based biodiverse agriculture.

“We came together as a group because we wanted to do something meaningful for the community, like reviving our millet,” said Suorhosa, the President of the Millet Sisters. Shuvithsü, joined the collective to secure a better future for her children and emphasised the need to safeguard resources for the next generation and ensure an alternative source of livelihood for her family.

In 2021, the collective purchased a portable rice cum millet dehusking machine using NEN’s support and a part of their sales from the produce. The Village Council supplied tin sheets to build a shed for the dehusking unit. Today, the Millet Sisters make the machine available for public use at a nominal fee of Rs. 50/- per tin.

The market demand for millets has increased in neighbouring villages and urban areas of Nagaland. The collective achieved nearly 700 kgs of annual harvest this year and expects a higher yield next year. The Agriculture Department provided financial assistance of Rs. 9900 for millet cultivation, and The Village Council recognised the crop’s potential and stated that each household should cultivate millets.

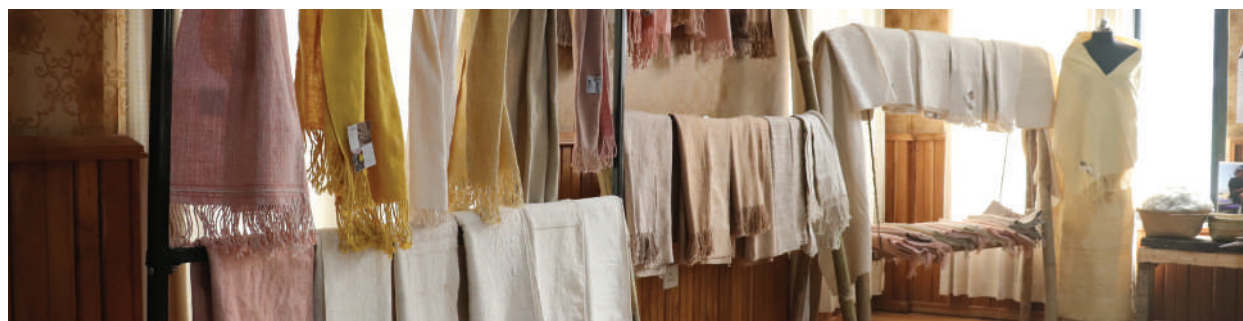
Our Seeds, our Farm: Towards Food Sovereignty

Women farmers shared stories of resilience in the face of adversities and challenges such as the pandemic and climate change in Dhemaji and Golaghat.

NAGALAND



The contribution of rural women was showcased at Kohima through – **A 'Farmers' Market'** with the theme 'Rural Women Cultivating Good Food for All', which exhibited and sold indigenous food and **'Tapestry'**, an exhibition and sale of handmade natural fibre products.

MEGHALAYA



The Rural Women's Meet at Rangthong, South West Khasi Hills District, raised awareness about rural women's contributions and promoted their rights. Their roles were celebrated through songs, dance, and games. Stakeholders from the Labour Department and the National Rural Livelihood Mission enriched women's understanding of their rights and entitlements. In another

event, rural women, men, youths, and children participated in a mini-fete at Thangsning, East Khasi Hills District. The campaign also featured women farmers from Jaintia Hills, West and Eastern West Khasi Hills, and East Khasi Hills showcase agricultural produce, handicrafts, and processed food items at a Farmers Market in Savio's Hall, Shillong.

Support group members, youth collective members, and students from local schools participated in tree-planting events across 6 districts.

NEN organised tree plantation and cleaning drives and witnessed active participation from children, youths, women, and men.

NEN organised tree plantation, nurturing, beautification and cleaning drives, awareness on the significance of indigenous trees and recycling campaigns in collaboration with SEWA Union, Chizami Students' Union, Jehohanan Strivers, G.M High School, Enhulumi Students' Union and Sumi Village Students' Union and other CBO's.

Facilitating Weavers' Access to Social Security

ASSAM



This booklet is a collection of motifs and patterns from different villages NEN works in. The Bodos, Misings, Karbis and different communities of Assam weave their creativity on looms and this booklet aspires to preserve them. Each community has a unique style of weaving and also curates magnificent designs. A traditional design is exquisite and tells a story. Inspiration is drawn from nature and everyday life. Insects, birds, animals, flowers, creepers, petals, leaves, trees, water, twigs etc. are significant in a weaver's imagination. The colours are also drawn from the natural surroundings and add aura and appeal to the woven fabric.

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NEN released a booklet with collated indigenous motifs of communities in 4 districts with 116 weavers.

NEN and Nenterprise-Chizami Weaves facilitated spot enrollment of artisan cards and PAN cards. They created awareness on various government services, programmes and facilities for the weavers and to facilitate socio-economic linkages.

Over the years, this project has successfully empowered dynamic youth fellows to take charge in conservation action and drive social change by leveraging the power of digital mediums.



MILESTONES

Responsible Tourism (RT) Fellowship



RTF '22 was launched in Aug'22 with 17 fellows from 6 states in North East India for six months to foster socio-economic well-being and ecological security through local youth and community ownership. The 6-month fellowship included training sessions and field visits facilitated by livelihood and responsible tourism experts. Exposure visits were conducted to understand the different parameters involved in responsible tourism practice, such as waste management, financial budgeting, identification of the unique selling propositions of each setup, crafting development strategies, etc. On March 14th, the first batch concluded in the RTF Conclave, where the action plans for Hebamlo in Nagaland, Chullyu, Monigong, and Gobuk in Arunachal Pradesh were presented to stakeholders.

Green Hub Festival



The GH Festival 'Towards a Resilient Future,' held from Nov 25th to 27th at the North Eastern Regional Institute of Water and Land Management (NERIWALM) in Tezpur, was a nod to the post-COVID world and the multiple challenges faced by people and the planet. The festival brought together a vibrant group of people and personalities to mark the GH Fellowship's conclusion and screen our fellows' films.



Padma Shri award winner Satyanarayanan Mundayoor, best known as Uncle Moosa, the travelling library man of India, inaugurated the festival and kept the audience spellbound with an Arunachali folk tale reading. New programs like the RT Fellowship, as well as other Alumni Projects, Small Grants & Films for the Habitats Trust, were introduced during the festival. The festival closed with certificates awarded to the 5th and 6th batches for successfully completing their Green Hub Fellowship.

Small Grants



Since 2017, small grant stipends have been given to Green Hub Alumni to carry forward their first steps in the field of grassroots conservation. In 2022, Small Grants were launched more significantly with the support of Royal Enfield CSR, with grants ranging

from 1.5 to 5 Lakhs. 20 projects were shortlisted for a mentoring workshop at Tezpur, followed by an open pitch to the Jury. 8 grants and 2 stipend support were awarded as part of this process.

18 projects by the GH alumni were represented in a five-day Small Grants' Pitch Mentoring Workshop held at Green Hub, Tezpur, from Sept 20th to 24th. The workshop involved mentoring sessions to help the participants improve their proposal-pitching skills. The participants were asked to brainstorm to furnish their proposals and work on their final presentations for assessment by jury members.



VOICES FROM THE FIELD

Championing Conservation

5th batch GH fellow, freelance documentary filmmaker and photographer Thejavikho Chase, from Kohima in Nagaland, works on environmental and cultural conservation films and is keenly interested in insect ecology. He gained recognition when his films – 'Rearing Giants' and 'Edible Insects of Nagaland: Stink Bug' won in the Emerging Talent category at the Nature in Focus Film (NIFF) Awards in 2020 and 2022, respectively. ATREE engaged him as a Junior Research Fellow to work on a coffee table book on edible insects. Thejavikho also enjoys making meaningful digital illustrations and is currently working as a grantee after winning one of the Small Grants in 2022. Under this grant, he is developing an illustrated book on folktales of his tribe – Angami Nagas.

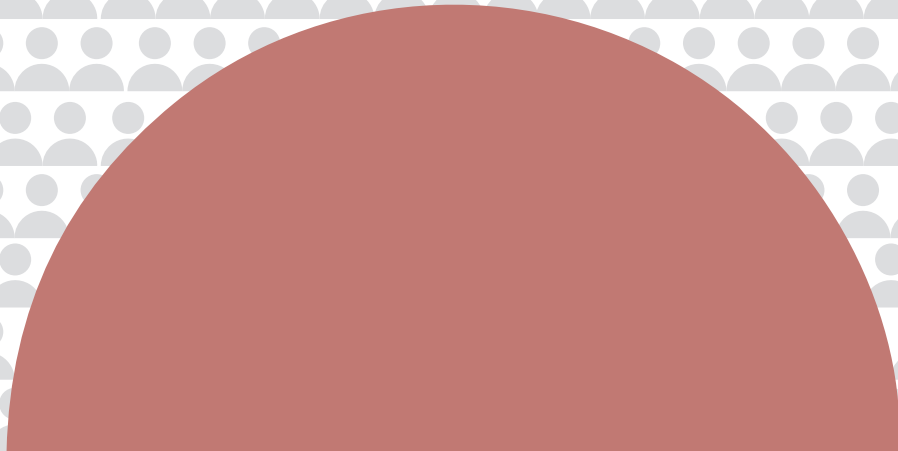
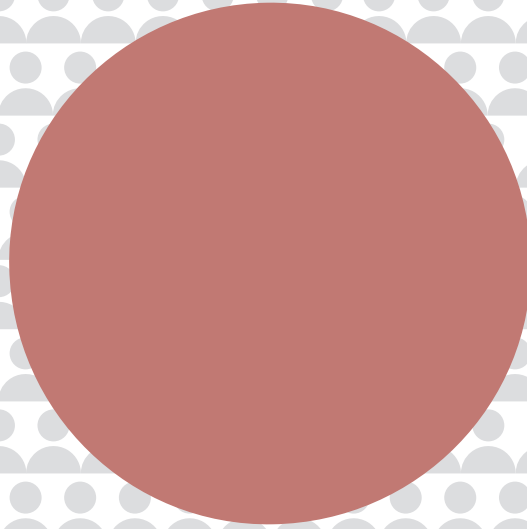

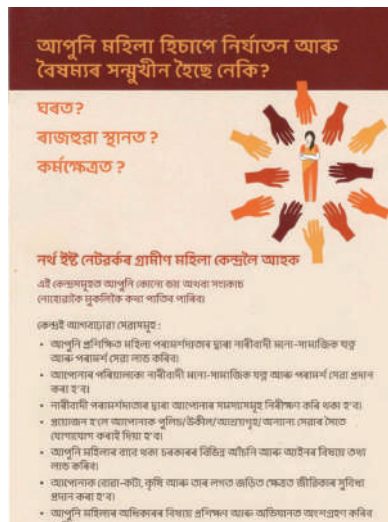
